And who would have thought that a gravestone in St Chad's would have attracted not just national but international press. The vandalising of Scrooge's gravestone, used in the 1984 film A Christmas Carol is such a well-loved relic of our modern history and I would like to thank those who sorted out its repair as quickly as they did.

Finally, I just wanted to pay tribute to our Town Council staff who are visibly present in our town, cutting the grass, watering the plants, operating the market, supporting our young people and much much more. Then there are those who provide the administrative support and guidance to enable those on the ground to do their work. Not to be forgotten I would like to thank my fellow Town Councillors who make the decisions. We all take great pride in our work, and everyone makes a real contribution to the Town's success – all of us ready to face the challenges and opportunities which look likely to appear in 2025.
